Listed below are Minneapolis Comm & Tech College (MCTC) courses most directly applicable to UW-River Falls Gen Ed requirements. This is intended as a guide for program planning and is subject to revision if degree requirements or course evaluations change. Students may also check for updates to the Gen Ed and program requirements in the on-line UW-RF catalog at: www.uwrf.edu/catalog.

I. GENERAL EDUCATION

- A. Communication – Reading and Writing (CW):** ENGL 1110
- B. Communication – Advanced (CA):** ENGL 1111
- C. Communication – Speaking and Listening (CS):** SPCH 1000 or 1005 (or BUSN 1154 if Bus or Mktg Com major)
- D. Humanities and Fine Arts (HF): Select one course from two different areas.**
 - 1. Art: ART 1110 (Required for Elementary Education majors)
 - 2. Film: FILM 1310, 1320
 - 3. Literature: ENGL 1150, 1157, 2225, 2226, 2231, 2232, 2251, 2252 (Lit is required for teacher ed students)
 - 4. Music: MUSC 1000 or 1150 (MUSC 1000 required for Elementary Education students)
 - 5. Philosophy: PHIL 1115, 1110, 1171
 - 6. Theatre: THTR 1131, 2150 (Required for English Education majors)
- E. Social and Behavioral Sciences (SB): Select one course from 2 different areas:**
 - 1. Anthropology: ANTH 1105
 - 2. Economics: ECON 1000 (Required for Social Work majors)
 - 3. Geography (Human/Cultural): GEOG 1101, 2204 (Also meets a non-western history/culture requirement for teacher education students)
 - 4. History: HIST 1000, 1010, 1100, 1110, 1200, 1210 (Also meets a western history/culture requirement for teacher ed students)
 - 5. Political Science: POLS 1101, 1103, 1104, 1110 (POLS 1101 required for Social Work majors)
 - 6. Psychology: PSYC 1110 (Required for Social Work majors)
 - 7. Sociology: SOCI 1105 (Required for Sociology and Social Work students)
- F. Sciences (S) and Sciences with Lab (SL): Select one course from two of the following areas, at least one with lab.** Students majoring in sciences, agricultural or environmental sciences areas may need more supporting sciences. All teacher education students need a biology course. Consult UW-RF catalog or academic departments.
 - 1. Biology: BIOL 1100, 2200 (BIOL 2200 required for phy. ed., social work, most science, agric sci majors)
 - 2. Chemistry: CHEM 1020, 1040, 1151 (CHEM 1151 required for most science majors and all agricultural sci majors)
 - 3. Geography: GEOG 1102
 - 4. Geology/Earth Science: GEOL 1120 & 1130 lab (Required for Geology or Conservation majors)
 - 5. Physics/Astronomy: ASTR 1110, PHYS 1100, 1131, or 1211 (PHYS 1131 or 1211 required for Agricultural Engineering Tech & Food Science majors)
- G. Mathematics (M):** Minimum Math requirements vary by major. Consult catalog or academic department.
 - 1. Select 1 from MATH 1110 or higher (MATH 1110 or 1120 or 1125 required for all agriculture majors. MATH 1170 or 1180 required for Business or Accounting students. MATH 1165 required for Elementary Education majors.)
- H. Personal Health and Wellness (HW) and Health/Physical Activity (HA):** This includes a wellness/healthy lifestyle component (HW) and a physical activity (HA) component.
 - 1. Courses which meet the HW component only: HLTH 1101, 1132, PHED 1100
 - 2. Courses which meet the HA component only: Any 1 credit activity course (PHED 1101 to 2207)
- I. Ethical Citizenship (EC):** Select one course from BIOL 1136 or JOUR 1000

Students who complete the Associate of Arts Degree are considered to have satisfied UW-RF Gen Ed, except for a junior/senior level “Multidisciplinary Inquiry” course, and any specific college, major or professional licensure requirements.

II. OTHER UNIVERSITY-WIDE REQUIREMENTS

 These courses may double count in any area of the UW-RF degree.

- A. UW System Ethnic/Cultural Diversity Requirement** (One course) This is generally taken at UW-RF, but courses such as ACES 1132, 1140, AMIS 1000, 1100, 1200, 1300, ENGL 1159, HIST 1300, 1310, 1500, SOCI 2145 would satisfy this requirement.
- B. UW-RF Global Perspectives Requirement** (One course) A course at the sophomore level or higher, which examines subject matter from a global/international perspective. This is usually taken at UW-RF.

III. MAJOR/MINOR COURSES Additional courses should be selected based on the intended subject area major/minor. Consult the UW-RF web site (www.uwrf.edu) for links to academic departments, program requirements and the catalog.

GPA standards and enrollment limits may be placed on specific majors if needed to stay within program capacity. Consult the UW-RF Admissions Office website for transfer admission standards. **Priority consideration** may be given to students who have completed the Communication, Math and Science requirements prior to transfer. **Transfer after one year** is recommended for teacher education, social work and agriculture majors.
