This 4-day training is intended to provide the following:

- Develop high level ability to conduct cognitive graphic interview
- Ability to explain rationale of interview steps
- Build high level understanding of suggestibility and memory of children
- Study contemporary literature regarding forensic interviewing
- Present understanding of relevant literature
- Build advanced capacity in non leading questioning process
- Engage in juried interviewing practicum
- Evaluate skills of self and others
- Demonstrate capacity through comprehensive examination

**** This training requires you to bring a video of yourself conducting a forensic interview. You and Ann will evaluate the video as a part of this training. Any video from the basic training will not be sufficient. If you do not videotape in your community and therefore may not have one to bring with you, please contact Kelli Bowe. We will need to make arrangement at the training for you to produce a video for self-analysis and consultation with Ann.**

Ann Ahlquist is a consultant, trainer and an adjunct faculty member at the University of Minnesota Graduate School of Social Work, formerly directing the University's Child Abuse Prevention Graduate Program. She is known world-wide for developing the forensic Cognitive Graphic methods of interviewing children or adults who may be victims of child maltreatment, particularly sexual abuse, family violence or other trauma. She began this process in 1984 with colleague Patricia Batko. Ann has interviewed over 4000 children and often shares the perspective of children in her trainings. She has trained over 20,000 multidisciplinary professionals, throughout the United States and international sites... primarily in law enforcement, juvenile justice, child protection and child welfare. She has written numerous articles and training pieces supportive of multidisciplinary and advanced training including her workbook "1984-2003: Cognitive Graphic Interviewing in Child Maltreatment and Domestic Violence". We are extremely fortunate to have her providing this training.
